



Smoker is Addictive Theatre By Joe Belanger, The London Free Press



Giving up something you love is tough but giving up that something when it also delivers a highly addictive drug seems near impossible.

But New York's Bob Brader did it and now he's sharing his story in the award-winning show, *Smoker*, on at The Good Foundation Theatre for London Fringe.

Brader, with a long reputation of being a master storyteller and winner of the best autobiographical show at the United Solo festival last fall, delivers a compelling performance talking about his life as a smoker from the age of 12 in a home where both parents smoked, including an abusive father whose love the young Brader relentlessly pursued.

"Smoking doesn't smell bad to me; it smells like home," said Brader, who as a child and through his teen years suffered beatings from his father for transgressions he doesn't understand to this day.

"It was like walking in a mine field, nothing I did seemed to work."

Then he started smoking to be part of the "cool" crowd, finding it helped calm his anxiety about his father.

The only Christmas gift Brader ever received from his father was a carton of cigarettes when he was 14.

"Smoking was the only time I felt any kind of connection with my father," said Brader. "Most of all, I never wanted to lose that connection I had with him."

What's compelling about Brader's story is there is not an ounce of preaching. It's told with brutal, sometimes embarrassing honesty, from the constant beatings to little moments where a smoke was a payoff for a job well done, an opportunity to meet new people or mix with theatre colleagues, a diversion from boredom, a comfort in loneliness and a substitute for love. Throughout the performance, Brader adopts the voices of a number of characters, including his mother, father, girlfriends and others. He talks about his efforts, including hypnosis, to quit. The lighting design of this show is excellent, supporting the mood swings and Brader's subtle

moves from internal thoughts to his outer voice.

It's 85 minutes of story telling that feels like 30, a feat few actors have the talent to pull off. Smoker is compelling theatre, fueled by Brader's masterful storytelling and acting talent, a show that must not be missed.

A Seemingly Personal Story with Universal Resonance

Bob Brader has long been a staple of fringe festivals and the reason why is evident in his newest work SMOKER. This play feature's Brader's signature mix of humour, autobiography, and his fantastic gift for telling a story. The play is his autobiographical account of his love affair with smoking and love affair is exactly the right way to describe it. Brader introduces us to his relationship with smoking by dovetailing it with a relationship breakup he has. Bob's affair with smoking is a lot like breaking up with a girlfriend. There are times when he thinks he is free of cigarettes, then the urge to smoke reemerges. It is the concern of his wife (and director of the play) Suzanne Bachner that spurs him to start the journey toward quitting smoking. Many of the themes that Brader introduced in his earlier work, Spitting In The Face Of The Devil, appear again in Smoker. He further explores the troubled relationship with his abusive father and highlights a specific and significant detail in that relationship – that smoking was the one thing they as a family would do together. One of Brader's gifts is that he can take what seems a personal story and make it universal. Smoker is very much an American story, in the tradition of Arthur Miller. By exploring his own abusive childhood, he reveals the trauma that existed in many homes in post-war America. This play sets the high bar for Fringe theatrical experiences – go and take it in.

We arrive to recordings of nostalgia cigarette commercials (listen for the guy who claims "he forgets to eat, but never forgets to smoke"), and then... we're hooked. There is no "smoke and mirrors" in this solid, hour-long monologue on smoking; just one man's honest examination of how and why he began the habit, and what cigarettes have meant to him at various milestones in his life.

Writer/performer Bob Brader from New York is a dynamic storyteller, with a wonderful, strong voice — hardly the pipes of a longtime smoker — and a talent for creating visuals and clearly delineating the various characters in his story (his interpretations of his cruel father and that mocking "voice of the cigarette cravings" are standouts). He relates things all smokers will understand (that click of the lighter, the sensual satisfaction of that first drag) while simultaneously informing the non-smokers along the way. Of course, I know smoking isn't good for me, I know it can kill me, it says so right on the package. When you're a smoker, you know the risks, you just don't want to think about it all the time, especially when you're smoking. No smoker wants to look at the cigarette they are smoking and think: is this the one that will kill me... His wife's comment about his smoking during a couples counseling session launches writer-performer Bob Brader's autobiographical, eloquent and entertaining solo play Smoker. It's a solid addition to the literary genre exploring the mystique and fetishization of smoking cigarettes.

I look at that Gold Zippo Lighter and think about the first time I ever saw this beauty. It shined as I held it in my hands... It glowed as I filled it with lighter fluid Mr. Brader's writing on this fascinating subject is sharp, insightful and well-observed. As a performer, Brader's breezy personability endows his personal odyssey with an appealing everyman quality as he appears as himself and

impersonates various other characters. At 80 minutes, the show is overall compelling. Cold turkey, gradual cessation, hypnosis and bicycle spinning are all attempted to stop with varying results.

The black-accented contained stage is set with a white chair and a small white table and is an effective minimalistic landscape. Director and developer Suzanne Bachner's staging is highly resourceful as it places Brader in various spatial areas with visual élan. Katie Chai's jolting lighting design accompanies the revealing storytelling with a variety of fluctuating brightness and redness.

From the age of 12 when he takes his first puff offered by a local girl to the present when he is smoke-free, we



experience a bevy of well-crafted anecdotes and incidents centering on his beloved Camel Lights. There's Brader's abusive ex-Marine two-packs-a-day father and his smoking, forlorn mother. The dysfunctional family becomes closer when Brader takes it up. "I was now a man...it connected us."

"Pink Floyd is the music drug addicts listen to!" is uttered in a wild section describing learning how to smoke marijuana with colorful rural Pennsylvania high school classmates in the 1970's, the era of AC/DC, and television's Kung Fu.

Bad romantic relationships endure due to the mutual addiction. The camaraderie of smokers in work and social situations is marvelously documented. New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg's 2003 smoking

ban in bars and restaurants incites a hilarious rant.

A visit to Los Angeles with his wife for a funeral leads to an ominous police encounter and psychological reexamination that strengthens the marriage. That richly rendered sequence is one of Smoker's numerous moving highlights.

This production is presented as part of "3 From JMTC." JMTC Theatre is a company founded in 1994 that "combines art and advocacy to raise funds and awareness." Smoker plays in repertory with two other solo shows, The Good Adoptee and Spitting in the Face of the Devil. Proceeds from this engagement go to You Gotta Believe, a foster youth organization and to the victim services agency Safe Horizon.



"Smoker" is Smooth and Satisfying

We may think we know all there is to know about smoking. It's all around us, both in our lives and in pop culture. We have seen the public service announcements, heard the lectures in health class, or watched someone we know waste away from a smoking-related illness. But Bob Brader's "Smoker" is unique among such stories. Although it concerns why he quit smoking, it is also a confession of his enjoyment of it, as well as an examination of why he smoked at all.

As Mr. Brader himself describes the show, "Smoker" explores how smokers feel about smoking, which is a perspective rarely considered. Mr. Brader recounts his exposure to cigarettes at a young age, not only by his smoker parents, but also by his peers. He freely admits that for him, like for most smokers, it is a coping mechanism. Cigarettes offer a temporary escape from everyday stress such as work or moving, and from emotionally trying experiences such as funerals. Mr. Brader acknowledges the social benefits of smoking, such as having a 'smoker identity' and enjoying the group bonding of smoking with others. In addition to all of that, he simply enjoyed the act of it. Smokers are aware of the risks and negative consequences but choose momentary payoff and rationalize it later. Every smoker smokes for a reason, and every former smoker quits for a reason. Mr. Brader discusses their motivations at length. At one point he shares something he heard from a former smoker: "If it weren't for my lungs, I'd still be smoking." Rather than preach about how the man's choice to smoke had contributed to his ill health, Mr. Brader admits that he understands that feeling.

Throughout his eighty-minute performance, Mr. Brader effortlessly alternates between energetically recounting humorous experiences and soberly addressing serious and dark subject matter. Each chapter of his story incorporates a skillful blend of narration, impersonation, physicality, pathos and humor that keep the audience's attention. However, the moments of greatest impact came when he spoke simply, honestly and directly about his life-changing experiences and epiphanies.

"Smoker" has the rare quality of feeling at once comfortable and natural, but also carefully planned and well-thought-out, without ever losing balance. It is a personal account made universal through its eloquent and enthusiastic delivery, and its sincere, thoughtful honesty. "Smoker" is both a lighthearted success story and a thoughtful cautionary tale, and neither aspect feels forced. It is a show that draws the audience in with sincerity, shares with them a meaningful message without pretense or judgment and leaves them thinking.

I have never had a cigarette habit. Once or twice I smoked a cigarette in a bar after one too many lemon drop shots, and in college back in the '80s I flirted with a few packs of Clove cigarettes from Jakarta--until I read in TIME magazine that they contained microbes. I wasn't sure what microbes did to you, but we were already terrified of herpes and AIDS, so I dropped them. Cigarettes may or may not have microbes: but we've known for a while that they can and do kill people: causing heart disease that leads to strokes and heart attacks, deadly and disfiguring cancers and lung disease that robs one of the ability to run, walk, talk and finally, breathe.

What is so compelling about smoking cigarettes? There is the physical addiction to nicotine which is so hard to overcome that out of the 35 million people per year who want to quit, only 15% are successful. In the thorough, moving and sometimes gut-wrenching show SMOKER, Bob Brader shares the history of his passionate and personal pas de deux with his dark savior "those sweet Camel lights".

Performed with only a chair, small table and crisp, perfectly-timed lighting changes, SMOKER relies heavily on Brader's excellent mimicry and acting as he moves through time highlighting the way smoking both soothed him and gave him a sense of belonging through a violent and often lonely childhood and teenage period. He plays his mother, father, neighborhood boys, teen girls, L.A. beautiful people, adult girlfriends and his own wife; and he captures them spot on. A particularly touching scene involves his accompanying a popular girl across an abandoned railroad trestle to deliver a very important package to her uncle on the run: a box of cigarettes.

Brader is also excellent at crafting just the right words and movement to demonstrate the multilayered appeal of the perfect cigarette experience: lighting one with a gold Zippo. By the time he finished his graceful pose and description of the lighter's internal friction, spark and click to the burning tobacco infused with delicate lighter fluid fumes, I was ready to light up. The recreation of his pure joy was remarkable.

The script for SMOKER is fully developed and eloquently performed. It's no wonder that it won "Best Autobiographical Show" at United Solo. The pre-show audio is filled with old radio and television cigarette commercials--some touting the "health benefits" of smoking. It's amusing and horrifying at the same time--which is an appropriate intro to Brader and Bachner's production. Fortunately, we get the sense that there's still hope for a happy ending; and a more endearing and genuine performer than Bob Brader would be hard to find indeed. Don't miss this unique, highly entertaining, first-class show.


